Community is integral to everything we do. So, in March, when the pandemic hit, our natural inclination was to band together and make it through. As an organization serving a high-risk population, safety was our first concern. We made new protocols, changed schedules to limit individual exposure, and even made our own PPE amidst the shortage.

As our world moved to a virtual format we had to make sure that people were connected to healthcare, education, and their communities. Our AT Lab Team created resources such as videos to explain how to participate in a telehealth visit. We launched our Assistive Technology Loan Closet with contactless pick-up and virtual consultations, which proved integral to many people accessing a virtual world and distance learning for the first time. As people began to feel the strain of isolation, the Supported Living Team created opportunities to connect virtually as a community. We had virtual bingo games, dance parties, birthday parties, and movie nights.

Just like all of you, the lives of the people we support had to keep moving forward in this new world. Our Employment Team supported people who were essential workers and even found people new jobs. Our Community Engagement Team gave the self-advocates the tools to continue making change virtually, and our Housing Team even found people new homes to call their own!

They key to all of this was our community... our incredible team, the adaptable people we support, our partners across Portland, and our friends and family. Together we made it here. Now, we look towards the future. Ahead is the task of making the world a more equitable place, not just for people with disabilities, but for ALL people. We will look to our community, to each and every one of you, to band together and continue to make change. Together, we will create a truly inclusive world.

One 10-year-old boy with autism, Yuto, was able to borrow an iPad loaded with educational and self-regulation apps for 3 weeks to support his independence and homeschooling. AT Lab helped mom advocate for developmental disability county funds to pay for his own iPad to have at home since the apps support his ISP goals.

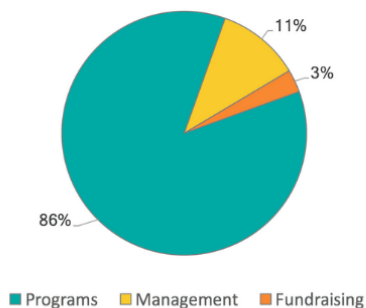

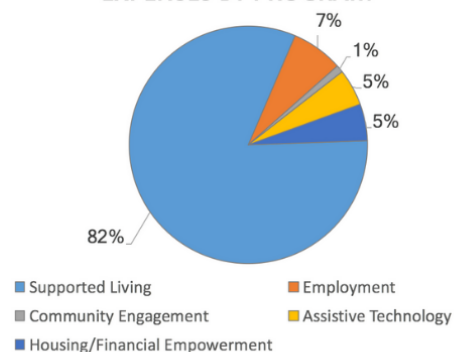
